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## About CPR

The Centre for Policy Research (CPR) is one of India's leading public policy think tanks. Established in 1973, CPR is a non-profit, non-partisan, independent institution dedicated to conducting research that contributes to high-quality scholarship, better policies, and a more robust public discourse.

Key Objectives:

1. To establish and to carry on the administration and management of CPR;

2. To plan, promote and provide for education and training in policy planning and management areas and to undertake, organise and facilitate conferences, seminars, study courses, training programmes, lectures and similar other activities for the purpose;

3. To promote and conduct research in matters pertaining to:

- a. the improvement of policymaking and management and building appropriate theoretical frameworks;
- b. the education, training and development of personnel involved in policy areas;
- c. the maximum augmentation and effective development of national resources including analytical and prospective studies of various sectors of the economy with a view to promoting national development;

4. To assist any institution in matters such as designing measurement tests for employee selection, appraisal programmes, conducting morale and productivity studies, streamlining organisational structure and to review, from time to time, the impact of educational, training and research activities and offer suggestions for filling the gaps in the operating systems;

5. To promote and undertake faculty development programmes to assure an adequate supply of competent researchers;

6. To maintain liaisons with professional institutions and educational bodies for the purposes of promoting research in policy sciences;

7. To provide consultancy services under its auspices or through its faculty to public bodies or any other institutions on matters having a bearing on performance, optimum use of organisational resources, or any other matter conducive to economic betterment;

8. To disseminate information on know-how on policy making and related areas by undertaking and providing for the publication of journals, reports, pamphlets and other literature and research papers and books in furtherance of the objects;

9. To establish and maintain libraries and information services;

10. To establish and maintain regional centres in India to promote the objectives of CPR;

11. To award diplomas, certificates and other distinctions and to confer degrees subject to approval by Parliament on candidates and prescribe standards of proficiency for the award of such diplomas, certificates, degrees subject to approval by Parliament, and other distinctions;

12. To confer honorary awards and other distinctions;

13. To institute and award fellowships, scholarships, prizes and medals in accordance with the rules;

14. To maintain close contact with other institutions having similar or related objectives, either wholly or partially, by way of payment or receipt of subscription, enrolment as a member thereof, fiscal or

other sorts of mutual assistance, amalgamation, merger, collaboration, cooperation, and in any other way as CPR may deem necessary;

15. To establish and maintain a fund with the contributions of any official or non-official institutions and agencies and with all other amounts of money acquired by CPR in any other way;

16. To utilise a part or whole of the fund towards capital and recurring expenditure of CPR, to make appropriate investments or to deal with the fund in any other way CPR may find it necessary;

17. To borrow or raise or secure the payment of money by issuing bonds; securities or in such manner as CPR shall deem fit;

18. To draw, accept, make, endorse, discount, execute, sign, issue or otherwise deal with cheques, *hundies*, drafts, certificates, receipts, government securities, promissory notes, bills of exchange or other instruments and securities whether negotiable or transferable or not;

19. To create administrative, technical, ministerial and other posts under CPR and to make appointments thereto in accordance with the rules of CPR;

20. To establish and maintain provident and other benefit funds for the benefit of the employees of the CPR;

21. To make Rules and Bye-laws for the conduct of affairs of CPR and to add, amend, vary or rescind them from time to time;

22. To constitute such committee or committees as CPR may deem fit for the disposal of any of its business or on such matters as CPR may like to be advised; and

23. To do all such lawful things as CPR may deem fit for the attainment of all or any of the objectives.

## **President's Report**

During 2023-24, in the month of November, the Centre for Policy Research (CPR) completed fifty years of serving the nation through its policy-oriented research and its active participation in public discourse on matters of national importance. The year was eventful in many other ways too. I am writing this Report because Ms Yamini Aiyar, my predecessor, stepped down as CPR's President and Chief Executive as of March 31, 2024.

In her seven years of stewardship, Yamini served the institution with dedication, diligence and hard work. She joined CPR in 2008 and founded the Accountability Initiative (AI) - the largest research cluster at CPR so far. As President, she facilitated the growth of large research initiatives and started the annual 'CPR Dialogues' to showcase our work for a wider audience.

This landmark 50<sup>th</sup> year was marked by the irony of shrinking operations due the continuing challenges and the consequentially reduced funding. CPR has tried to remain resilient and productive. During the year, our scholars published three books with reputed publishers, viz., Springer, Routledge and Cambridge University Press. They have also published 280 articles/ papers in the national and international dailies and journals. The Annual Report will provide more details of CPR's continued impactful engagement with policy thinking and public discourse.

But this is a fraction of what we could have achieved. CPR has suffered grievously. Its many research projects, initiatives and associated operations have had to be abandoned or truncated. It has witnessed dwindling numbers of its research scholars as well as the administrative staff. The uncertainties with future funding forced CPR to discontinue several of employees, majority of them young scholars. Though many scholars continue with CPR, often in an honorary capacity, others have relocated and repositioned in many ways.

Despite being affected by reduced funding, the Accountability Initiative, one of the largest initiatives focusing on enhancing transparency and accountability in governance and widely known for its budget briefs, has continued with its impactful work during the year. The Initiative has worked with the governments of Rajasthan, Karnataka, Nagaland on a wide variety of research and policy engagements during the year.

A similar scaling down of operations was witnessed with other initiatives: the Initiative on Cities, Economy, and Society (ICES), the Scaling City Institutions for India (SCI-FI), the State Capacity Initiative (SCI), and the Initiative on Climate, Energy, and Environment (ICEE). Yet, as you will see, these initiatives remained productive with their research and policy engagement from the outputs detailed out in the report. ICES's research on the Smart Cities Mission culminated in a white paper on urban governance released during the National Workshop on Streets & Public Spaces in January 2024. It also worked with NIUA on a post mission strategy for the smart cities. SCI-FI's outputs include a book *Social Innovations in Urban Sanitation: Meeting Unmet Needs*, highlighting the role of CSOs in sustainable sanitation. The initiative has collaborated with the Meghalaya government and the World Bank on the MPOWER project, addressing adolescent health and education challenges. The State Capacity Initiative's activities focused on subnational capacity building. Its support to Tamil Nadu Human Resources Reforms Committee led to a report presented to the Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu. The Initiative also developed and conducted a Special Induction Training for the 2023 batch of Nagaland Civil Service probationers for the Government of Nagaland.

Drawing on resources across the institution, CPR continued an initiative started by Accountability Initiative and State Capacity Initiative to engage with the Government of Andhra Pradesh in building their capacity to use data analytics to improve governance across multiple areas, such as tax administration at different levels, beneficiary selection and electricity distribution. The Initiative on Climate, Energy, and Environment (ICEE), known for its prolific research outputs and vibrant policy engagement remained active for the most part of the year. I am pleased to share that some of the research scholars from the Initiative repositioned themselves as a separate entity, the Sustainable Futures Collaborative, and continue to pursue the Initiative's important research agenda. Though unfortunate and unintended, it is but another instance of CPR incubating initiatives into institutions.

Despite these challenges, CPR continues to display its resilience through its other initiatives, though with reduced momentum. The Land Rights Initiative (LRI) and the Politics Initiative remain active with their research and public engagements. The Politics Initiative published a significant book, *Dalits in the New Millennium*. The Initiative launched a series talks *How India Votes* featuring 24 discussions leading up to the 2024 general elections, moderated by Rahul Verma. The Transboundary Rivers, Ecologies and Development Studies (TREADS) Initiative, anchored around the Ministry of Jal Shakti Research Chair established by the Ministry of Jal Shakti, Government of India, under its MoU with the National Mission for Clean Ganga (NMCG) has been very active with their research projects supported by the NMCG. The Initiative has launched *Planners Circle* workshop series to engage with practicing urban planners to inform and reimagine statutory spatial planning in Indian cities. Their TREADTalks continue to host talks on a wide variety of topics.

While our tribulations with the tax authorities continue, we have complete faith in India's courts and institutional processes and remain confident that we will be cleared of all the allegations of irregularities. This is undoubtedly the most difficult phase for CPR in the past five decades of its existence. We are fortunate to have a strong and supportive Governing Board led by Dr Meenakshi Gopinath. Their belief in CPR and its core values is our biggest strength. Most of all, the continued trust and support of the larger CPR community keeps us going. Thank you so very much for believing in us. The road may be long but we are certain that CPR will emerge from all this with renewed strength and a greater sense of purpose.

## **CPR's Initiatives**

## 1. Accountability Initiative

The initiative works on strengthening transparency and accountability in governance through evidence-based research on state capabilities and factors affecting efficient public service delivery in India. With a vision to enable responsive governance, the initiative works to increase citizen engagement in policy making and implementation.

#### i) Key Research Outputs

- The Accountability Initiative published a study on *Using Data for Better Policy Formulation and Evidence-Based Decision-Making* – Rajasthan Case Study as a part of its MoU with the Chief Minister of Rajasthan's Economic Transformation Advisory Council (CMRETAC). Using the case studies of education, health and Panchayati Raj departments, the study unpacked how data is collected and used and studied use cases of data and how it can feed into policy improvement. The study then provided recommendations on how to strengthen data systems, manage data flows and use it for more effective evidence-based decision-making. The research team includes Avani Kapur, Ritwik Shukla, Sharad Pandey and Sidharth Santosh.
- In 2023, the Accountability Initiative in partnership with the World Bank produced a primer on India's health budgets. The main objective of this primer is to offer the reader a way to understand and interpret India's Union and state health budgets. The primer is co-authored by Avani Kapur, Ritwik Shukla, and Sharad Pandey, from the Accountability Initiative and Rajesh Jha and Owen Smith from the World Bank.
- In 2023, Avani Kapur, Ritwik Shukla, Tanya Rana, Purnima Menon, and Suman Chakrabarti, in partnership with the International Food Policy and Research Institute (IFPRI), authored a Policy Note on *Financing Nutrition in India: Cost Implications of the Nutrition Policy Landscape 2022-23*. The Policy Note aimed to estimate the potential costs to deliver at scale (i.e. 100 percent coverage) for a core set of Direct Nutrition Interventions (DNIs) for FY 2022-23.
- Sidharth Santhosh authored an article titled "Institutionalising social audits: Lessons from Meghalaya" in *Ideas for India* in June 2023. The article summarises key findings from Meghalaya's experience of mandating social auditing for welfare schemes, including the need for stronger coalitions between citizens and the state, and greater autonomy of the institutions conducting oversight.
- Rajika Seth, Sidharth Santhosh, Avani Kapur, Neeha Susan Jacob and Pritika Malhotra authored a Policy Note titled *Making It Work: Institutionalising Social Audits in Meghalaya in India* in 2023. This policy note unpacks how social audits have been institutionalised in Meghalaya. By identifying strategic action that the State government took to pass the Act, the policy note presents reflections on the current state of affairs on social audits.

#### ii) Select Policy Engagements

- Governance, accountability and public finance In 2023, the Accountability Initiative was commissioned by the Chief Minister's Rajasthan Economic Transformation Advisory Council (CMRETAC) to undertake a study to recommend suggestions on how to strengthen data systems and enable the state for more effective evidence-based decision-making. The findings and recommendations were presented to the CMRETAC upon completion of the study.
- In June 2023, the state associates of the Accountability Initiative team facilitated a workshop for the She Represents Program organised by the Indian School of Democracy. In the workshop, the team trained women-elected representatives from across India on topics related to decentralisation, public administration, public finance and e-governance.
- Sidharth Santhosh, Neeha Susan Jacob and Mridusmita Bordoloi of the Accountability Initiative facilitated training sessions for bureaucrats at the Nagaland Administrative Training Institute in April 2023. A wide range of topics such as accountability between citizens and the state, gender budgeting and administrative data management were covered.
- In FY 2023, the PULSE for Development celebrated reaching a milestone of 100 member organisations with a talk titled "Commemorating 100 Organisational Members Advancing India's Welfare Challenges through Collaborative Practice". During the session, we highlighted the power of coalitions in driving sustainable development. By bringing together diverse stakeholders, we can pool resources, share ideas, and create innovative solutions to tackle India's welfare challenges.
- Further, the PULSE for Development held two series of Coffee Chats with a total of 7 chats over the year, each focused on critical social and developmental themes. The Coffee Chats were divided into two series:

a. The Dignity Series: Shined a light on how vulnerable groups are organising and advocating for their rights and

b. The Coalition Series: Emphasised the importance of collaboration among CSOs, government, and development practitioners to create systemic change and address welfare challenges.

Through these sessions, we emphasised the transformative power of coalitions like PULSE for Development. By working together, sharing knowledge, and influencing policies, we can make a real difference in promoting sustainable development and tackling the complex challenges facing India today.

#### These included:

i. Change Agents: Reframing the Disability Experience: We talked about the 21 million Indians living with disabilities and how their role in development is often overlooked. Despite policies like *The Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act of 2016*, they still face significant challenges. This session highlighted the importance of representation and the experiences of advocates working to secure rights and entitlements for people with disabilities.

ii. Lessening Vulnerability: Dalits and Tribals as Change Agents on Climate Adaptation: Climate change impacts everyone, but marginalised communities like Dalits and Tribals are hit hardest. We explored how these groups are fighting for their rights and adapting to climate change, discussing environmental discrimination and the need for policy and community collaboration.

iii. Change Agents: Livelihood Opportunities for Vulnerable Genders: Transperson individuals in India face immense challenges in finding decent work, often due to discriminatory practices and social barriers. This session delved into their struggles and showcased real-life examples of how they are gaining access to education, training, and employment.

iv. Empowering Choices: Collaboration on Reproductive Health and Family Planning: We focused on reproductive health and family planning in rural areas, tackling issues like stigma, discrimination, and gender inequality. Experts shared best practices and innovative approaches to ensure everyone has access to comprehensive healthcare services.

v. Promoting Inclusive Education for Children with Disabilities: Despite efforts, many children with disabilities in India still lack access to education. We discussed the policy challenges, best practices, and the role of governments and civil society in promoting inclusive education for these children.

vi. Unlocking the Potential of Digital Healthcare in India: Digital healthcare can revolutionise medical access, but rural areas still lag behind urban centres. We examined the disparities, discussed the potential of digital healthcare, and looked at policy challenges and the way forward.

vii. How Are Women-Led Organisations Changing the CSO Landscape?: With only 38% of nonprofits led by women, we explored the unique challenges these leaders face and their impact on the sector. We discussed how women-led organisations influence culture, values, and diversity within the CSO space.

#### iii) Select Public Engagements

- Governance, Public Finance and State Capacity and Federalism: Avani Kapur was a panellist in the National Conference on the Journey of Local Democracy in India organised in Ranchi from 21-23 June 2023 by the Azim Premji Foundation. The panel titled 'Local State Capacity in India' included Uma Mahadevan Additional Chief Secretary, Panchayat Raj, Gov of Karnataka), Prof V N Alok (Professor at Indian Institute of Public Administration), and Prof Bhaskar Chakrabarti (Professor at IIM Kolkata)
- Health and nutrition Tanya Rana was a panellist at the Jindal School of Government and Public Policy (JSGP) Policy Forum on Towards Improved Menstrual Health: A Policy Dialogue in February 2024. She discussed insights from on-ground implementation of key menstrual health services in Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, and Rajasthan.
- Ritwik Shukla was a faculty member as part of the 11<sup>th</sup> year edition of the Capacity Building Programme on Public Health and Nutrition (PHN) organised by the Centre for Chronic Disease Control (CCDC) in partnership with the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI), New Delhi.
- Avani Kapur was a panellist in a webinar on Financing Air Quality Improvement organised by the ICEE team, CPR wherein she discussed findings.

- Avani Kapur was a faculty as part of PRIA's learning programme on Social Accountability and Advocacy for the Asian grantees of the Education Out Loud (EOL) programme which is funded by the Global Partnership for Education (GPE). Participatory Planning and Budgeting focuses on budget analysis and advocacy.
- Avani Kapur took a session on Introduction to Educational Finance for 3rd year BEIED students in Gargi College.
- Avani Kapur is part of a World Bank Working Group on 'Prioritizing health in the government budgets.
- Avani Kapur is part of the Technical/Policy Advisory Group Meeting for the updated investment framework on nutrition.

#### iv) Partnerships and Collaborations

- In May 2023, the Accountability Initiative team in collaboration with Piramal Swasthya conducted a two-day workshop for elected representatives in the Barwani district of Madhya Pradesh. The workshop focused on topics related to the public administrative structure and process of planning and budgeting at the Gram Panchayat level.
- As part of the partnership, the Accountability Initiative undertook a research study to study emerging patterns in health financing with a focus on NHM. The study sought to identify the extent of funds spent on tribal health, and analyse release and utilisation patterns of NHM and where possible the tribal health component. Draft report for Chhattisgarh with a deep dive in Bastar and district reports for Pakur and Badwani were shared as part of the deliverables.

## 2. Initiative on Cities, Economy, and Society

The Initiative on Cities, Economy and Society (ICES) engages with the process of urban transition in India, tracking its evolution in spatial, economic and social terms. In particular, the initiative focuses on how urbanization is managed and how it affects people's engagement with the state.

### i) Key Research Outputs

- In August 2023, CPR, in collaboration with LIRNEasia Ecosystems and the Indian Institute of Human Settlements, published a report titled *Ecosystems of Engagement: Digital Platforms and Women's Work in Sri Lanka and India*. The report was the culmination of a three-year-long project investigating the effect of digital platforms on women's work and empowerment.
- Drawing on its ongoing analysis of the Smart Cities Mission, CPR collaborated with consultancy firm Arthur D Little to publish a World Economic Forum white paper titled *Smart Cities: Promoting Urban Governance in India.* The report was formally launched at the National Workshop on Streets & Public Spaces on 13th January, 2024 in Pimpri Chinchwad under the aegis of the Smart Cities Mission in the presence of Mr Kunal Kumar, Joint Secretary Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs and Mission Director, Smart Cities Mission, Mr Shekhar Singh, Pimpri-Chinchwad Municipal Corporation (PCMC) commissioner and Pimpri-Chinchwad Smart City CEO and other dignitaries. Representatives of the team behind the report, Mr Purushottam Kaushik, Head, Centre for the Fourth Industrial Revolution, World Economic Forum, Mr Brajesh Singh, President-India, Arthur D Little and CPR Fellow Mukta Naik were also present at the occasion. Partha Mukhopadhyay, Senior Fellow, Mukta Naik, Fellow. Research Associates Asaf Ali Lone, Anwesha Mallick, Barathi Nakkeeran and Ananya Sharma contributed to the white paper.
- In May 2023, Mukta Naik published a paper titled 'Federal aspects of India's emerging internal migration governance frameworks' as part of the State Capacity Initiative's Working Paper Series on Cooperative Federalism in India.
- In 2023, Marie-Helene Zerah published a co-authored paper with Khaliq Parkar K., and Gaurav Mittal on 'Platformisation, Infrastructuring, and Datafication: Regional Variations in the Digitalisation of Indian Cities' in the Economic and Political Weekly, LVIII, 14, 53-60,
- In December 2023, Shamindra Nath Roy co-authored a paper with Anant Maringanti titled 'We just Gotta do Meta! Methodological Anxiety of Geography in India' in the *Transactions of the Institute of British Geographers*.
- In October 2023, Pushpa Pathak and Partha Mukhopadhyay, in partnership with Sunghoon Kris Moon and Hong Soo Lee, Asian Development Bank jointly a chapter titled 'Urban Finance during turbulent times' in the flagship report of the UN-ESCAP titled *Crisis Resilient Urban Futures: The Future of Asian & Pacific Cities 2023.*

#### ii) Select Policy Engagements

- Mukta Naik and Shamindra Nath Roy were interviewed for Volume 5 Issue II of the journal *Conversations in Development Studies* brought out by the Centre for New Economic Studies, O.P. Jindal University, in July 2023. Mukta Naik's interview in the issue titled *Beyond Bricks and Mortar: The Unseen Realities of Urban Housing* addressed the question *The Right to Shelter or Profit Maximization?* While Shamindra Nath Roy spoke about the ways in which *Social Segregation is Directly Linked to Housing*.
- The Initiative continued to organise the ongoing Urban workshop series in collaboration with the Centre de Sciences Humaines (CSH). Last year, CPR organised 12 workshops. This platform is intended to create a space for interaction between practitioners working on various facets of urban studies, planning, and governance.
- On 11th July 2023, CPR organised a workshop with Richa Nagar, Professor in the College of Liberal Arts, University of Minnesota, Twin Cities, U.S.A. Focusing on the idea of 'radical vulnerabilities' the workshop drew on Prof Nagar's multilingual and multi-genre scholarship, which engages with creative writing, theatre and activism. During the session, a mixed group of feminist scholars, activists and practitioners came together to discuss questions of knowledge production, and socio-political and epistemic justice.
- In February 2024, Mukta Naik attended a round table discussion on women and work organised by the International Development Research Centre, Canada during the Indian visit of IDRC President Julie Delahanty. The round table identified areas of policy focus related to women's employment in the Indian and Asian contexts.
- Starting October 2023, Mukta Naik was a part of the Academic Advisory Group of the Jharkhand Migration Survey, being undertaken by the Safe and Responsible Migration Initiative for the Government of Jharkhand. The white paper based on the survey was formally submitted to the Secretary, Department of Labour, Employment, Training and Skill Development, Government of Jharkhand in June 2024.
- In October 2023, Mukta Naik attended a Consultation on the World Bank's Gender Strategy 2024-2030 where feedback was solicited from Indian experts on substantive aspects of the new strategy, which was eventually finalised in June 2024.

## 3. Initiative on Climate, Energy and Environment

The Initiative on Climate, Energy and Environment (ICEE) aims to stimulate an informed debate on the laws, policies and institutions shaping climate, energy and environmental governance in India. ICEE's research focuses on an improved understanding of climate, development and environmental challenges—and pathways to improved outcomes—in three key areas: climate policy and institutions, the political economy of energy transition in India, and air quality governance.

#### i. Key Research Outputs

- Suravee Nayak and Ashwini K Swain co-authored a policy brief titled 'Gender and Just Transition: Envisioning a Gender-transformative Pathway to Energy Transition in India's Coal States' on April 10, 2023. The policy brief makes a case for a gender-transformative pathway to energy transition in India's coal states. It provides an overview of patterns of gender exclusions in the coal economy, analyses its consequences on women's status in coal regions, and suggests steps to engage with the gender question as part of just transition planning.
- Shibani Ghosh, Bhargav Krishna and Abinaya Sekar published a working paper on 'Regulating Air Quality at an Airshed Level in India' on August 2, 2023. The paper unpacks some of the key issues relating to airshed-level governance and what is required to make that transition in India. It lays out an institutional framework for airshed level air quality management, suggests how airsheds can be notified, and how states can coordinate regulatory efforts.
- Bhargav Krishna and Abinaya Sekar co-authored a working paper titled 'A Health-Centred Framework for Establishing Ambient Air Quality Standards' on September 26, 2023. The working paper suggests a structured approach to revising current and future National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) in India – with health at the centre of the process. It proposes an inclusive, expert-driven institutional process, with appropriate timelines, evidence integration, and public participation for the Indian context.
- Shreya Shekhar, Tamanna Dalal, Sidharth Santhosh, Aditya Valiathan Pillai and Bhargav Krishna published a working paper titled 'Finding the Finance: A Guide to Identifying Centrally Sponsored Schemes to Fund Heat Resilience Solutions' on December 5, 2023. The authors map heat-resilience solutions proposed across 37 Indian heat action plans (HAPs) against interventions in India's Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSSs), Central-Sector Schemes (CSs), and an Act, all implemented by states with significant financial support from the Union government. These cover areas as diverse as the creation of low-cost affordable housing, the construction of artificial water bodies, urban greening, and changing the way settlements are built, among others.
- Parth Bhatia wrote an article on 'India's state-led electricity transition: A review of techno-economic, socio-technical and political perspectives' in the journal *Energy Research & Social Science* on July 17, 2023. The article assesses the academic and policy literature on India's electricity sector transition from 2011 to 2022 and synthesises it along three broad perspectives: techno-economic, political, socio-technical and a fourth cross-cutting perspective 'justice'.

- Navroz K Dubash and Aditya Valiathan Pillai co-authored a book chapter titled 'Climate Governance and Federalism in India' in *Climate Governance and Federalism: A Forum of Federations Comparative Policy Analysis* (Cambridge University Press). It gives an account of the forces shaping climate governance in India's federal architecture, building on descriptions of environmental federalism, state actions in climate policy, and several recent policy moves by both the Centre and states.
- Sarada Prasanna Das co-edited a volume titled 'Media, Politics and Environment: Analysing Experiences from Europe and Asia' (Springer) which studies the emergence of environmental policies from a media studies perspective. A chapter authored by him titled 'State's Commitment to Environmental Governance in India: Struggle Between Developmental Pressure and Sustainability Challenges' highlights the challenges and opportunities in different spheres of environmental decision-making.
- Navroz K Dubash wrote an article in *Nature* titled 'The G20 should forge a pact to support nations' shifts to a low-carbon future' on July 5, 2023. The article suggested that G20 leaders consider framing a declaration on climate change and development around three components: National and concrete assessment of needs, credible delivery of transition support, and a guiding principle of using fossil fuels only where they make the greatest contributions to welfare.
- Navroz K Dubash wrote an article in *Science* titled 'Rebalance attention from global target setting toward national climate politics and policy' on October 6, 2023. It argues for the need to rebalance attention from generating global pressure for ambitious target-setting and toward the detailed work of shifting politics and building policies at the national level.
- Annanya Mahajan, Shibani Ghosh, Prannv Dhawan and Bhargav Krishna co-authored a working paper titled 'The State of India's Pollution Control Boards: Are they in the green?' in April 2023. The paper, part of a series on pollution control boards, looks at the revenue, expenditure, investments and financial autonomy of pollution control boards in 10 states in the Indo-Gangetic Plain. It analyses the finances of these Boards over 3 financial years (2018-19, 2019-20, and 2020-21).
- Ashwini K Swain, Navroz K. Dubash, Catherine Ayallore, Sarada Prasanna Das, and Arunesh Karkun, along with authors at Prayas (Energy Group) and WRI-India, jointly published an indicator guidebook on May 22, 2023, under the Energy Transition Preparedness Initiative (ETPI), a state-level framework to assess plans, actions, and governance processes towards an energy transition. The guidebook presents a set of 24 indicators that can be used to assess states on their preparedness to undergo an energy transition across various sectors.
- Additionally, as part of ETPI, Ashwini K Swain, Sarada Prasanna Das and Catherine Ayallore co-authored a report on August 1, 2023, on the electricity sector's preparedness for energy transition in 10 states. Ashwini K Swain co-authored an op-ed in *The Hindu* titled 'Seeing India's energy transition through its States' on June 7, 2023.
- Parth Bhatia, Mandakini Chandra, Navroz K Dubash and Aman Srivastava co-authored an article on 'Keeping development at the forefront of India's long-term climate strategy' in *Ideas for India* on June 5, 2023. The article expands on the opportunities and challenges of low-carbon transitions in India's Long Term Low Emissions Development

Strategy, illustrating how these transitions might interact with India's social and economic sectors.

## 4. Land Rights Initiative

The Land Rights Initiative (LRI) aims to build systematic knowledge of land rights issues in the country. The initiative's research focuses on the constitutional right to property, land acquisition, land rights in the scheduled areas and mapping land legislation in India.

Namita Wahi is the principal investigator for this project, which also has participants from Stockholm, Bern, Lappland, Academia Sinica, Gothenburg, Amsterdam, Rome, Trento, Haifa, Prague, Taiwan and Maastricht. Wahi participated in a series of project meetings and online workshops to develop the theoretical foundations of the project.

c. International Group of Experts on "Land and Housing"

Namita Wahi was part of a select group of experts invited to be thought partners on the "Prevention Project: Development, Inequality & Corruption Workstream - Land & Housing Rights subgroup" led by the Centre for Human Rights and Global Justice, New York University School of Law. ### 5. Scaling City Institutions for India (SCI-FI) Initiative

Over the past year, the Scaling City Institutions for India (SCI-FI) initiative continued to research, innovate, experiment, learn and inform faecal sludge management (FSM), city-wide inclusive sanitation (CWIS) and affordable and slum upgradation policies and programmes at the state and national levels, keeping the poor and marginalised at the centre. The SCI-FI programme is committed to driving ahead its research agenda to reflect emerging themes and apply theory to practice. Through research, the programme focused on building the capacities of stakeholders, including the three tiers of government, to develop better-informed policies and programmes enabling improved governance and service delivery, especially to the poor and marginalized.

#### i. Key Research Outputs

• Shubhagato Dasgupta and Anju Dwivedi from SCI-FI, CPR with Kaustuv Kanti Badhopadhyay, Sumona DasGupta and Bharti authored the book Social Innovations in Urban Sanitation: Meeting Unmet Needs (Routledge India; May 2023). This open-source Routledge publication is based on research on CSOs that have been pivotal in promoting contextual and sustainable innovative models to improve urban sanitation in India for decades. These innovations range from mobilizing citizens, particularly from low-income communities, to generating awareness and demand services from the service providers, building community-managed systems for ensuring the sustainability of created assets, providing low-cost infrastructure solutions, organizing informal sanitation workers to demand dignity and justice, generating critical knowledge and promoting collaboration and partnerships with various stakeholders including governments and private institutions to serve the unserved communities.

#### ii. Select Policy Engagements

• Based on the Institutional Assessment for Improving Health and Education of Adolescents in Meghalaya, conducted by SCI-AI in collaboration with the WB, a discussion workshop on key findings and way forward was organized under the Chairpersonship of Development Commissioner, Planning, Investment Promotion and Sustainable Development. This workshop also included the Secretary of the Health and Family Welfare Department, Commissioner and Secretary of the Education Department with the World Bank team.

#### iii. Select Public Engagements

- A book discussion event on *Social Innovations in Urban Sanitation: Meeting Unmet Needs* was organized on 9 August 2023 by SCI-FI and PRIA with key stakeholders, including civil society organizations, academia and funding partner organizations, to deliberate upon how all stakeholders could contribute to creating a more robust ecosystem for social innovations and the critical role that CSOs need to continue to play in the sector to promote access of affordable and equitable sanitation to urban poor.
- Shubhagato Dasgupta, Senior Fellow, SCI-FI, made a presentation on a case study titled "Urban-Rural Convergence for Faecal Sludge Management" in the launch event of the 3<sup>rd</sup> URL (Urban Rural linkage) Compendium organized on 11 October 2023 by Policy, Legislation and Governance Section (PLGS) of United Nations Human Settlements

Programme (UN-Habitat). UN-Habitat. The Compendium included the case of Dhenkanal on urban-rural Convergence on FSM last year, i.e., in 2022-23.

• Anju Dwivedi, Associate Fellow, SCI-FI, made a presentation on "Challenges faced by Sanitation Workers" based on a study on *Social Protection of Sanitation Workers* in a Technical Consultation Workshop on Promoting Decent Work for Sanitation Workers in India with a focus on Hazardous and High-Risk Work" on 30 November 2023.

#### iv. Partnerships and Collaborations

• To address issues of adolescents, the state Government of Meghalaya, with World Bank support, is conceptualizing a project named Meghalaya Programme for Adolescent Wellbeing, Empowerment and Resilience (MPOWER), which aims to engage adolescents, youth, and parents through innovative platforms to build resilience and improve well-being.

To inform MPOWER, an Institutional assessment was undertaken by SCI-AI with support from the World Bank, focusing primarily on health, education, and intersectionality with other Departments like Planning, Labour, and Social Welfare to document the key challenges, gaps, sector-specific findings, good practices, common findings and propose recommendations based on them. The study included Institutional and stakeholder mapping and a review of the functioning of the District and Block administration. SCI-FI undertook this rapid assessment in the State of Meghalaya, where 80 stakeholders from the State Government, District, Block, and Community (including Adolescents) were interviewed. The study revealed issues related to planning, monitoring, financial flow, governance mechanisms, and capacity building of key stakeholders (including government officials, schools, counsellors, and community-based institutions) involved in service delivery and existing support systems available for adolescent children.

#### 6. State Capacity Initiative

The State Capacity Initiative is an interdisciplinary research and practice program focused on addressing the challenges of the 21st-century Indian state. It focuses on the changing roles of the Indian state; institutional design, implementation and administrative capacity; the challenges of regulatory and fiscal capacity; and the changing relations between society, politics and state capacity in India.

#### i. Select Policy Engagements

a. State Civil Services Training: Government of Nagaland

- Foundational training programmes for new civil service officers are an essential first step in their journeys towards becoming officers, not just because of the knowledge they acquire about the functioning of government and government programmes, but also as a site to hone their professional identities and skill sets as public servants. In India, the All India Services receive comprehensive training at apex institutes such as the Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration (LBSNAA), however similar quality of training is largely not available for officers of the State Civil Services. Keeping this in mind, the State Capacity Initiative has worked closely with Administrative Training Institutes (ATIs), the primary training ground for state civil servants, across several states to reimagine and deliver novel training programmes.
- Building on previous years, in April and May 2023, CPR's State Capacity Initiative conceptualised and conducted a 6-weeks Special Induction Training for NCS (Probationers) 2023 Batch, sponsored by the Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms, Government of Nagaland. The training included two flagship modules. Values and Skills for the 21st Century Civil Servant and Essential Knowledge: Overarching Issues and Sector Knowledge.
- CPR Faculty, Deepak Sanan, Mekhala Krishnamurthy and Rahul Sharma anchored the course as key resource persons and several CPR faculty across initiatives shared their expertise and delivered sessions, along with leading academics and practitioners from diverse fields.
  - b. Tamil Nadu Human Resources Reforms Committee
- The people who work in government (or, in more technical terms, the state's human resource capacity) are central to the effective delivery of services and ensuring welfare of citizens. Recognising the importance of human resources, the Government of Tamil Nadu constituted the Human Resources Reforms Committee (HRRC) to study the status of, and propose reform measures to enhance the performance, as well as the social inclusiveness of the public sector workforce. The HRRC examined the processes of recruitment, workforce planning, training and capacity building to identify opportunities for reform and to highlight and learn from examples of existing reform initiatives across departments in Tamil Nadu. Over 10 months in 2023, over which the HRRC deliberated on reform measures, the State Capacity Initiative provided research and analytical support as the Research Secretariat to the HRRC.

• Our work involved conducting extensive fieldwork and interviews with government officials occupying diverse positions in Tamil Nadu, desk research to collate the latest knowledge and practices on human resource development, data analysis of existing human resources data to identify critical trends in recruitment, retirements, and social inclusiveness, and support for the drafting of the report. The report was submitted to the Hon. Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu in November 2023.

#### ii. Select Public Engagements

i. Talk on Mission-Driven Bureaucrats by Dr Dan Honig at CPR

• In November 2023, the State Capacity Initiative hosted a special talk at CPR by Dr Dan Honig, Associate Professor of Public Policy, University College London (UCL) and at Georgetown University's McCourt School of Public Policy. Dr Honig presented data and arguments from his book *Mission Driven Bureaucrats*, which is about how the humans who work for the state often are or can be driven by a desire to help deliver on the things their agency does – educating children, helping sick people get better, ensuring the trains run on time. "Managing for compliance" – rules, regulations, targets – works for some kinds of tasks and people, but not others. Based on his research and that of many others, he concludes that in some contexts, "managing for empowerment" – allowing autonomy, cultivating competence, and creating a connection to peers and purpose – is more likely to lead to better organizational performance.

# 7. Politics Initiative

Established in 2019, the Politics Initiative provides high-quality research to understand the rapid changes in India's political economy landscape. It studies the evolving political party system, political and legislative institutions, ideological preferences of political actors, electoral behaviour, and the incentive structures shaping policy decisions.

## i. Key Research Outputs

- The Politics Initiative launched an insightful book titled "Dalits in the New Millennium" edited by Sudha Pai, D Shyam Babu, and Rahul Verma in July 2023. The book delves into the evolving experiences of Dalits amidst the growing changes in India's socio-economic and political landscape. It aims to examine how despite the long history of violence and discrimination that Dalits have faced, their lives have significantly transformed over the last three decades, offering a comprehensive understanding of the Dalit experience in contemporary India.
- Rahul Verma, Fellow, Politics Initiative authored an article in the *Journal of Democracy* titled "The Exaggerated Death of Indian Democracy". In this article, Verma critically examines the dominant narratives about the decline of Indian democracy. He argues that despite facing significant challenges and setbacks, India's democratic institutions remain robust and adaptable. Verma's analysis provides a balanced perspective, acknowledging the strengths and deficits of the current state of Indian democracy.
- Pradeep Chibber and Rahul Verma, both key contributors to the Politics Initiative, have co-authored a piece titled *Economic Ideology in Indian Politics: Why Do Elite and Mass Politics Differ?* Published in *Studies in Indian Politics.* This article examines the contrast between the economic ideologies of the political elite and those of the masses of India. Their research analyses the underlying reasons for these differences and focuses on how economic policies and preferences are influenced by various socio-political factors.
- The Politics Initiative at CPR, in collaboration with Azim Premji University, conducted a comprehensive survey of political workers to understand their role in establishing an effective linkage between voters and political parties. The survey was conducted between December 2023 and January 2024 across five states: Kerala, Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan, Assam, and Maharashtra. A total of 220 political workers were interviewed. The purpose of this survey is to shed light on the crucial role party activists play in connecting voters with their respective parties at the district level. The findings from this survey will help create a paper that aims to provide valuable insights into the dynamics of political activism in India.

## ii. Select Public Engagements

• The Politics Initiative at CPR launched a series in 2023. Titled *How India Votes,* it features 24 conversations leading up to the 2024 general elections. Moderated by Rahul Verma, a Fellow at CPR, these discussions focus on critical themes shaping voter behaviour and election dynamics in India. Each session brings leading experts to the fold to delve into various topics of electoral importance. The series aims to create a deeper understanding of the Indian election for a diverse audience.

- Rahul Verma appeared on the *Interpreting India* podcast by Carnegie India to discuss the ongoing debate on democratic backsliding in India. This episode delves into the complexities and various perspectives surrounding the state of democracy in India. Verma's insights provide a nuanced understanding of the challenges and resilience of Indian democracy.
- The book *Dalits in the New Millennium* was also discussed in a podcast episode between D Shyam Babu and Milan Vaishnav on *Grand Tamasha* by Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. The episode explores the significant shifts in the experiences of Dalits over the past three decades and the complex socio-political landscape they navigate. This discussion provides deeper insights into the themes covered in the book.

## iii. Partnerships and Collaborations

• The CPR-Mint-YouGov Millennial Survey is a biannual collaborative effort that began in 2018, to provide valuable insights into the perspectives of young Indians. The 10th round of the survey took place in August 2023, followed by the 11th round in February 2024. This ongoing series examines the attitudes, aspirations, and behaviours of millennials, shedding light on their views regarding politics, the economy, and social issues. The survey results are featured in a series of detailed reports and articles and cover a wide range of topics. These include millennials' preferences for political leaders, their economic concerns and expectations, their views on social justice issues, and their engagement with digital media and technology.

# 8. Transboundary Rivers, Ecologies and Development Studies Initiative (TREADS)

The TREADS Initiative is a research cluster anchored around the Ministry of Jal Shakti Research Chair established by the Ministry of Jal Shakti, Government of India. The initiative pursues research interests in the broader area of water policy and governance with particular focus on transboundary river water governance covering intra-state, interstate and international. The research interests extend to federalism, politics of infrastructure development (dams, roads, smart cities), and urban water security.

The initiative has a MoU signed in 2021 with the National Mission for Clean Ganga (NMCG) to pursue a long-term research programme to inform policy and institutional ecosystem to rejuvenate India's rivers beyond the *Namami Gange*. TREADS scholars are currently involved in NMCG supported research projects looking into water-centric urban planning, lessons for India from European experiences of river rejuvenation and interstate cooperation for improving the outcomes of *Namami Gange* programme. As part of the research activities, the Initiative has launched *Planners Circle* workshop series to engage with practicing urban planners. The initiative's talk series, TREADTalks continue to host talks on a wide variety of topics.

# Library Information and Dissemination Services

The CPR library has a collection of a total of 10974 books after weeding a few old books, during the year 2023-2024. The collection mainly comprises books on policy sciences, economic policy, urbanization, political science, futurology, social indicators, foreign policy, Defense and other areas relevant to the research programmers of the Centre. The library subscribed to 17 journals and received gratis 40 periodicals. These cover major policy fields of concern to scholars at CPR. In addition to these, 18 daily newspapers are being received in the library. [11 newspapers received as hardcopy (till Dec 23) and remaining 7 newspapers received as digital version only (till Nov 23)]

The library continued to be a member of the Developing Library Network (DELNET), New Delhi (till July 31, 23). One Samsung SCX 4521F multifunction printer and one HP Elite 8300 is being used by CPR faculty/researchers.

With the help of CANON IR ADV 4545 Digital Plain Paper Copier with Reverse Automatic Document Feeder, Duplexing for Automatic Back-to-Back copying, Set making, Sorting, Rotate sorting, 25%- 400% Zoom with A-3 Size Network Laser Printer and Scanner, and 250 GB Hard Disc + 2 GB RAM for document server, better and efficient reprographic facilities were provided to researchers and other staff of the Centre.

For other material and publications, the CPR library depends upon the services of 20 libraries of various academic and other research institutions in Delhi which have been generous enough to lend their books and journals for the Centre's use on the principle of reciprocity.

CPR received a corpus of Rs. 50 Lakh from the Department of Economic Affairs, Ministry of Finance, Government of India in the year 1994-95. An interest of Rs. 3.01 Lakh was earned during the FY 2023-24 on the investment of said corpus, of which a sum of Rs. 3.01 Lakh has been utilized during the year towards maintenance and development of Centre leaving a balance of Rs. 0.07 Lakh at the end of the year (including previous balances).

Rs.155.46 Lakhs were received from the Ministry of Jal Shakti, Government of India during the FY 2023-24.

#### Tax Exemption for Donations to CPR

CPR has been approved u/s 35(1)(iii) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 w.e.f. April 1, 2005, which entitles the Donor under the present Income Tax Laws a weighted deduction @100% of the amount of donation and provisional approval was obtained further which is valid from FY 2021-22 till FY 2023-24. CPR has also been approved u/s 80G(5)(vi) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 for the period from April 1, 2011, onwards which entitles the donor 50% tax deduction of the net qualifying amount and CPR further obtained provisional registration under clause (i) of first proviso to sub-section (5) of section 80G valid from FY 2021-22 till FY 2025-26.

#### **Independent Auditors' Report**

#### TO THE MEMBERS OF CENTRE FOR POLICY RESEARCH

#### 1. Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of CENTRE FOR POLICY RESEARCH ("Society"), which comprise the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2024 and the statement of Income and Expenditure Account for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

(Refer Note No. 7 of Schedule 11 of the Financial Statements)

Our opinion is not modified in respect of the above matters.

#### 4. Responsibilities of management for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the Society in accordance with the accounting principles generally accepted in India, including the accounting standards issued by ICAI, to the extent relevant and practical. This responsibility also includes maintenance of adequate accounting records for safeguarding of the assets of the Society and for preventing and detecting frauds and other irregularities; selection and application of appropriate implementation and maintenance of accounting policies; making judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and design, implementation and maintenance of adequate internal financial controls, that were operating effectively for ensuring the accuracy and completeness of the accounting records, relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statement that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.
